Section 6102 Page 136 Line(s) 2755-2758

Strike lines 2755 through 2758 [Section 6102] and insert the following in their place:

- 1 "Sec. 6102. In Fiscal Year 2016, the Office of the People's Counsel ("OPC") shall award
- 2 a grant, on a competitive basis, in an amount not to exceed \$125,000, for a study to address
- 3 emerging alternatives for energy choice for residential customers in the District of Columbia, and

1 the integration of those alternatives into Pepco's evolving smart grid. OPC shall also award a
2 grant, on a competitive basis, in an amount not to exceed \$125,000, to provide targeted outreach
3 and education of low income and elderly residents regarding the benefits and options for energy
4 efficiency programs and practices.”

Fiscal impact statement:

See the revised fiscal impact statement as released by the Chief Financial Officer on June 26, 2015.

Rationale:

Currently section 6102 of the engrossed version of the Fiscal Year 2016 Budget Support Act requires the Office of the People’s Counsel to award a grant of up to \$250,000 for a study to evaluate the cost, benefits, and feasibility of establishing a municipally owned public electric utility in the District. This amendment would change the objective of the grant to a study to address emerging alternatives for energy choice for residential customers in the District and the integration of those alternatives into Pepco's evolving smart grid, and to the award of a separate grant to provide targeted outreach and education to low income and elderly residents regarding the benefits of and options for energy efficiency programs and practices. Each of the two grants could not exceed \$125,000.
